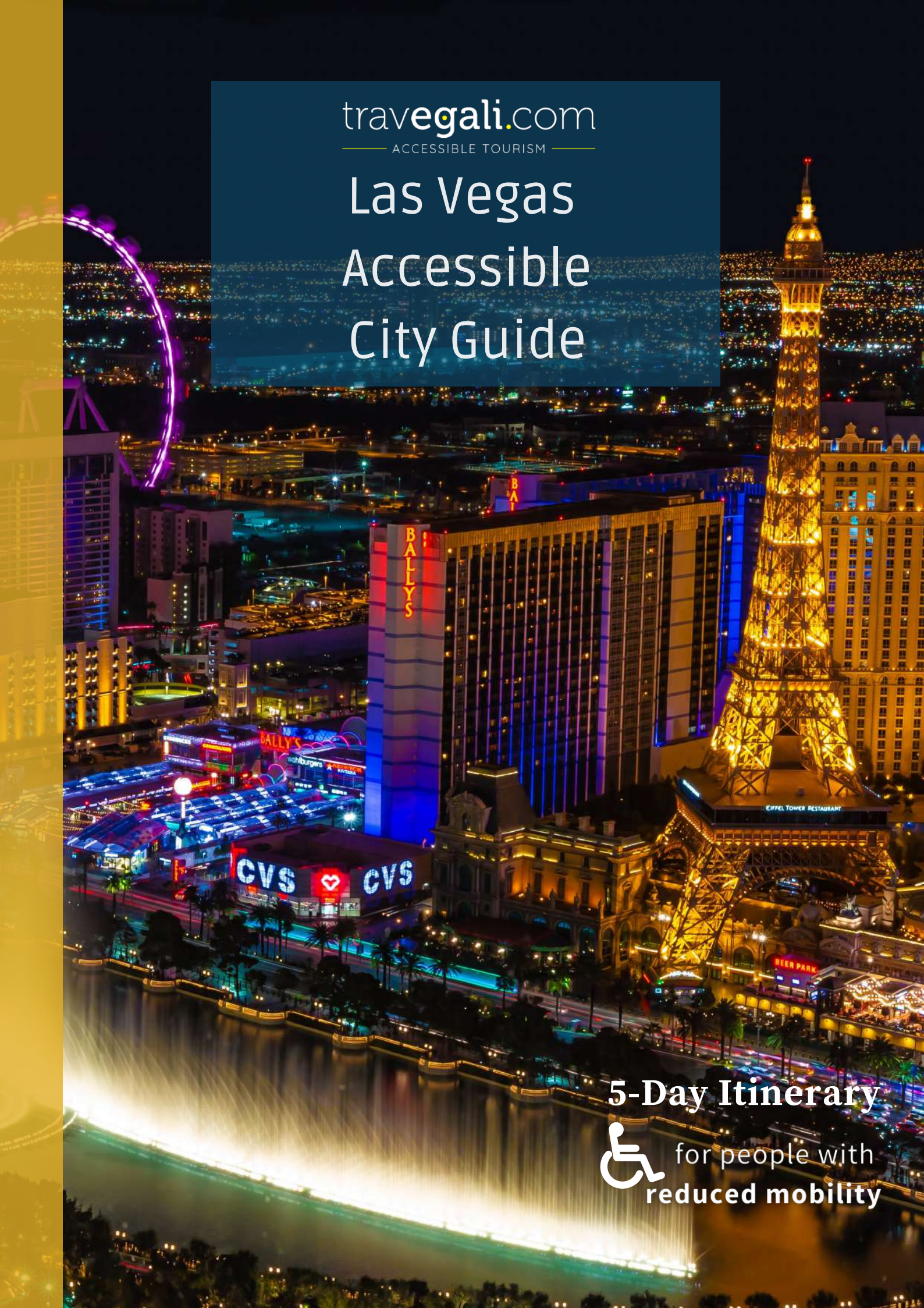

Welcome to the “entertainment capital”, otherwise known as “Sin City”. Built in the middle of the desert, **Las Vegas** stands out for its bright casinos attracting millions of visitors each year.

But this city in the state of Nevada is not just for gambling, although it has undoubtedly contributed to its popularity. In it we can see elaborate replicas of the most important monuments in the world, explore the museums and enjoy impressive shows. Likewise, you can find calm in the rocky and arid landscape of its surroundings.

Las Vegas is a destination for everyone. It has accessible hotels for people with reduced mobility, accessible public transportation and tourist attractions that can be visited by anyone regardless of their physical abilities.

In this guide we invite you to make a 5-day **accessible itinerary**. However, you can always choose the information that interests you and plan your trip around your schedule.

Accessibility at the airport

McCarran International Airport ensures that all passengers can properly board the aircraft. Consequently, it provides services for people with **reduced mobility** and has accessible facilities.

- Complimentary wheelchairs provided by Gateway, Prospect, and SAS Services Group.
- Rest areas for service animals.
- Accessible breastfeeding suites.
- Accessible unisex restrooms.

5-Day Accessible Itinerary

Day 1

If you arrive in Las Vegas early, we recommend that you take some time to relax at your hotel after your trip. If you are staying in an establishment with an accessible pool or spa, you can take the opportunity to go for a refreshing swim before starting to explore the city.

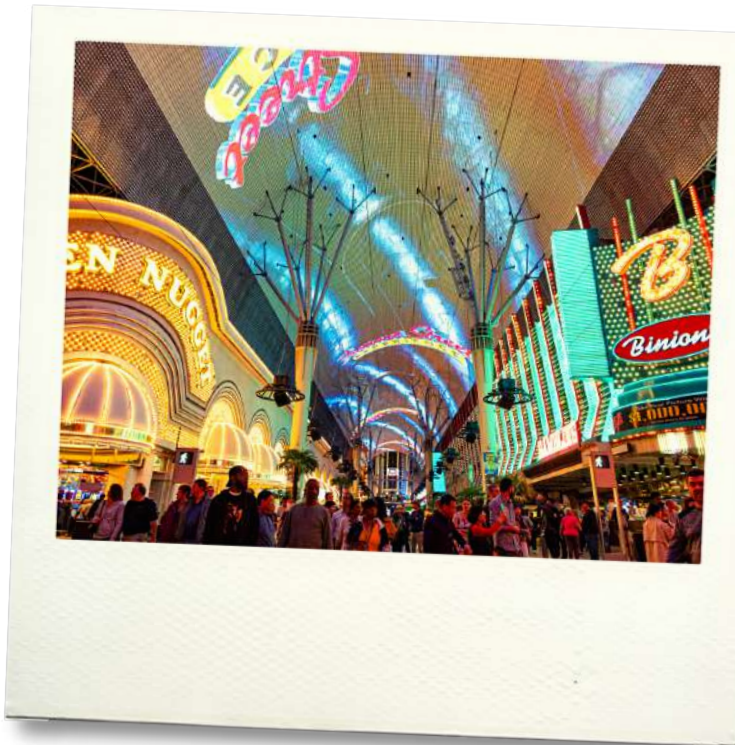
Next, start by visiting [Fremont Street](#). [Find a good restaurant](#) in the area and enjoy a delicious meal. Las Vegas has a variety of dining options, and many establishments are **accessible to wheelchair users**.



If you have more time on the first day, you can visit the legendary **The Mob Museum** (just 500 meters from Fremont Street), which has the following characteristics:

- Four accessible parking spaces for people with reduced mobility.
- Elevator to access the museum and avoid the step in the entrance.
- Service animals are welcome.
- Wheelchairs may be requested on a first-come, first-served basis..
- Free admission is offered for a travel companion with the purchase of a ticket.

Of course, you should not miss out on the most striking entertainment offered at **Viva Vision**, whose featured program begins at six in the afternoon and ends at two in the morning.



Day 2

After recharging with breakfast, explore the most famous street, the **Las Vegas Strip**. You have the option of taking a tour with **Big Bus Tours** (the entire trip takes approximately 2.5 hours), since it has **accessible vehicles** that have wheelchair lifts. However, not the entire fleet is accessible, so be sure to request accessible transportation at least 48 hours in advance.

The **Paris Las Vegas accessible hotel** awaits you. You can go shopping in its many shops set in the French capital, visit the grand casino and take pictures of its monuments.

The Eiffel Tower in Las Vegas, a beautiful half-scale replica, has become an iconic attraction of the city. During your visit you can also see the Montgolfière balloon, the Arc de Triomphe and the Place de la Concorde.



In the afternoon you can explore the **Seven Magic Mountains**, located less than 25 minutes from the Las Vegas Strip. However, you should be aware that there are no bathrooms nearby. The parking lot is paved, but not the path leading to the sculptures.

Then head back and enjoy a delicious dinner and relish in the boisterous nightlife.



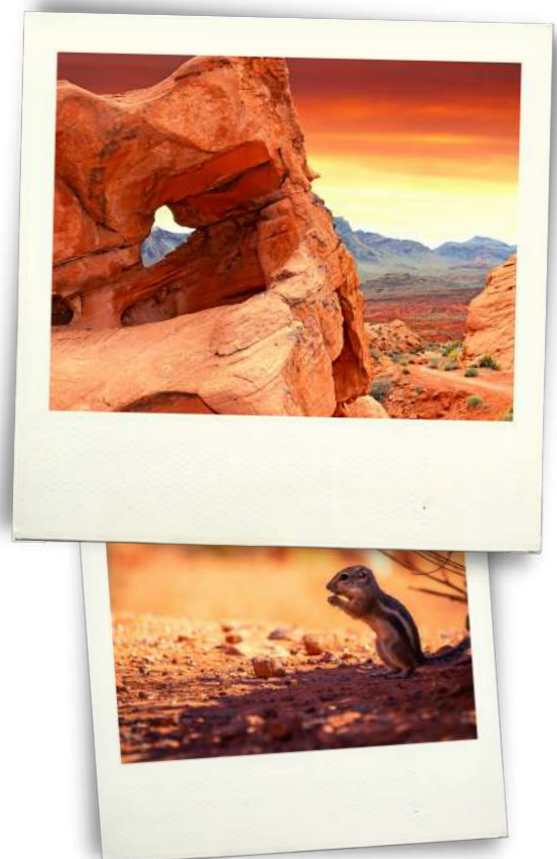


Day 3

Get away from the busy city and visit **Valley of Fire State Park**, the oldest state park in the state of Nevada. Its spectacular rock formations stand out for their red color and make up a unique landscape.

The Nevada State Parks official website indicates that people with physical disabilities can request assistance by calling 775-684-2793. Likewise, it is specified that the campsites are accessible.

Once you return to the heart of the city and rest, you may want to get away from the haste. For example, visit the peculiar [The Neon Museum](#) and discover the history of Las Vegas through its iconic signs.

The museum is **accessible** to both manual and motorized **wheelchair users**. The surface of the area is made of very fine gravel, so visitors can move around freely. If you need, you can be accompanied by a service animal.





Day 4

Start the morning by getting lost in the beautiful **Bellagio Botanical Conservatory and Botanical Garden** of the **Bellagio hotel**, where you will be delighted with the beautiful sculptures made by an expert horticulture, engineering and design team. Observe the flower's striking colors, listen to the soothing sounds and smell the aromas.





Once you've finished journeying through the place, head to **The Venetian** (1 mile away from the Bellagio). Take a tour of its luxurious facilities, go shopping in the Italian-themed stores and enjoy a magnificent gondola ride. The Venetian is an **accessible hotel** for people with **reduced mobility**. It provides, among other services, wheelchairs, scooters and medical beds for its guests. In addition, assistance animals are welcome.



At night, don't forget your date with the **Fountains of Bellagio**. Check the schedule in advance and contemplate a beautiful aquatic exhibition that you will never forget.





Day 5

Have an early breakfast and head over to the “**Welcome to Fabulous Las Vegas**” sign. You will have to wait to get a photo, as it is a place that attracts many tourists, but it will be worth the wait.

As it is your last day in Las Vegas, you can also take the opportunity to relax at the hotel. Eat at a good restaurant and leave for the airport when the time is right.





More accessible attractions

1 Visit the Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area

The [Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area](#) is a twenty-minute drive from downtown Las Vegas. It has **accessible trails**, so everyone can visit it.

The Visitor Center, Red Spring, Willow Springs Picnic Area, and Red Rock Lookout are all accessible. In addition, there are restrooms for people with reduced mobility located in the visitor center and along the way.

2 Go zip-lining

[SlotZilla](#) offers the incredible opportunity to “fly over” the Fremont Street Experience. According to its official website, there are elevators available to access the take-off platform. There is also a supervisor who accompanies **wheelchair users** to the platform and greets them when they land. However, some restrictions apply for security reasons. Check in advance at the box office or call 702-678-5780.



Transportation around the city

It is essential that during your trip you can adequately navigate to all the places you want to visit. Therefore, do not forget to take a look at this list with pertinent information about transportation and mobility services.

- **Yellow Checker Star**. Accessible taxis.
- **Las Vegas Monorail**. Accessible Monorail.
- **Get Around Mobility**. Wheelchair, scooter and other mobility aid rentals.
- **Las Vegas Wheelchairs**. Wheelchair and medical equipment rentals.
- **Scottround**. Wheelchair, scooter and walking aid rentals.
- **Las Vegas Mobility Store**. Wheelchair, scooter and other mobility aid rentals.
- **Las Vegas Scooters and Lifts**. Scooter and lift rentals.
- **Cloud of Goods**. Wheelchair, scooter and medical equipment rentals.
- **Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada's (RTC) paratransit service**.
- **Wheelers Accessible Van Rentals**. Accessible van rentals.



Medical attention

Remember that if a serious medical emergency arises during your trip, you can call 911. If it is a minor problem, check with the hotel itself or go to the nearest pharmacy.

Traveling with health insurance is an essential necessity. If you need medications, carry them with you in your hand luggage accompanied by a prescription.

Nevertheless, here is a list of some **hospitals, specialized centers and medical services** in Las Vegas, so that you know where to go shall emergency arise:

- **Sunrise Hospital and Medical Center.** Hospital with the largest intensive care unit (ICU) in Las Vegas.

- **Centennial Hills Hospital Medical Center.** Highly-skilled orthopedic medical team.
- **MountainView Hospital.** Medical center in Northeast Las Vegas.
- **Valley Hospital Medical Center.** Medical attention in downtown Las Vegas.
- **Kindred Hospital Las Vegas – Sahara.** Long-term acute care hospital.
- **Desert Orthopaedic Center.** Orthopedic medical services in Las Vegas and surrounding areas.
- **Nevada Orthopedic & Spine Center.** Comprehensive orthopedic medical care.



Other useful information

Check the weather

Las Vegas has a more moderate climate and a lower influx of visitors during the spring and fall, allowing you to visit the tourist attractions comfortably. Summers are usually very hot, so be careful.
